Summer Flounder, Scup and Black Sea Bass Fisheries Management Plan Update with Proposed NJ Regulatory Options

Black Sea Bass

On 2/8/18 the ASMFC's Summer Flounder, Scup and Black Sea Bass Board approved Addendum XXX which establishes a regional allocation of the coastwide Recreational Harvest Limit (RHL) as opposed to Coastwide Measures. Allocations will now be based on both historical harvest and exploitable biomass rather than just historical average which had been done in the past. JCAA supported using this new method as it addresses changes in the resource's distribution and abundance. In recent years this fishery was managed by a two-region approach but there will now be three regions. The three management regions are defined as Massachusetts

through New York, New Jersey as a state-specific region, and Delaware through North Carolina. JCAA supported that option as well because New Jersey is a transitional state in which its sea bass fishery doesn't really fit in with the states to its north or to its south. This option will allow the NJMFC to set regulations that best suit our fishermen while allowing them to address spatial variation in size and abundance. However, there could be more volatile regulatory consequences if we over fish our regional quota.

The timeframe for setting allocations was a contentious issue. JCAA recommended using the ten-year time frame from 2006-2015 as it more accurately captured our historical share of the harvest. States to our north preferred using the fiveyear time frame from 2001-2015 as those were the years when their share of the harvest had skyrocketed. Tom Fote was away on vacation for this meeting and his proxy was unable to attend due to a family emergency. That left Adam Nowalsky to carry the torch for our state and he did an outstanding job representing us. The states seemed hopelessly deadlocked on the timeframe issue until Adam made a motion to combine the allocations from each timeframe and then take the average of the two. This hybrid approach resulted in an allocation of 65.35% of the recreational harvest limit for the northern region (Massachusetts-New York), 30.24% for the New Jersey Region and 8.41% for the southern region (Delaware-North Carolina). While the compromise was not the best solution for us as our historical share of the RHL was much higher, it is probably about the best we could have hoped for under the circumstances. The board also agreed with the JCAA position to adjust management measures to the allowable catch limit, though this may take until 2019 to be implemented as it has to be further refined. This method should be an improvement from the status quo method of annually evaluating the recreational fishery based only on harvest against the RHL. It is expected to result in better data and reduced mortality which hopefully will create more fishing opportunities for our fishermen. Educational programs to reduce mortality such as the one New Jersey has for summer flounder could be developed that would not only enhance our fishing opportunities but help maintain the sustainability of our stock.

So the \$50,000 dollar question probably is what does this mean for our regulations this year.

Unfortunately, we don't quite know yet but it seems that the severe cutbacks that were indicated in the charts in the draft addendum won't be as severe. New mathematical formulas will be used that will smooth MRIP numbers that seem way out of line. This will help smooth over extremely high harvest numbers like the ones in wave 6 (November-December) for New York in 2016 and wave 3 (May-June) for New Jersey in 2017. This may result in regulations similar to those we had last year but we won't know for a couple more weeks.

Additionally, the ASMFC as well as the MAFMC at their meeting a week later, voted to remove the mandatory closure of the sea bass fishery in federal waters from 9/22-10/21. That will benefit the states to our south as their regulations are identical to those in federal waters. It may also be beneficial to some states to our north as there are transportation issues when moving into and out of state and federal waters in the area of Block Island. At this time, though, it may not help New Jersey unless we decide to reduce our bag limits and instead fish more days during September and October.

Summer Flounder

For 2018, the ASMFC approved New Jersey being its own region with no strings attached to what the other regions decide regarding their regulations. As you may recall, last year we were our own region but we were required to have the same 19" size limit that the Connecticut-New York region had. Our state won its appeal of that requirement and we were able to remain at 18" though our season length was reduced by 24 days. At the joint meeting of the ASMFC and the MAFMC this past December, states were given the approval to liberalize their regulations by up to 17% for 2018. Based on that, NJ submitted the following three proposals which were all approved. All have an 18" size limit and a bag limit of 3 fish. The seasons could either be from 5/15-9/16, 5/22-9/20 or 5/25-9/22. It is possible that these options could be tweaked a little or other new ones developed but that is unlikely. (The special regulations of 3 fish at 17" for Delaware Bay and 2 fish at 16" for Island Beach are expected to remain the same) While JCAA has not yet voted on which proposal to support, I anticipate that we will favor the one with the season ending on 9/22 as we need to bridge the gap to when sea bass season opens. Last year many of our fishermen were outraged when fluke season ended on 9/5 as sea bass season was closed until 10/22. That left our inshore fishermen

little to fish during that nearly seven week long period of time other than a limit of one blackfish and porgies for the boats in the northern part of the state.

Scup (Porgies)

We received some good news on porgies as we will be allowed to increase our harvest by 59%. This will allow New Jersey to have a year-round season. Previously our season was closed from March 1st to June 30th. The bag and size limits will remain the same, 50 fish at 9".

When will regulations be set for the aforementioned species? Regulations for fluke, sea bass, scup and perhaps blackfish will most likely be set at the next NJMFC meeting. This meeting will be held at 5PM on Thursday 3/15/18 at the Stafford Township Municipal Building located at 260 East Bay Av. in Manahawkin. The public is encouraged to attend and give their opinion on any of the proposals. JCAA will keep you posted as to specific options as they become available via our newsletter and on our Facebook page.

JCAA Votes No to Selling Striped Bass in NJ

In JCAA's February newsletter, I wrote an article "Proposal to Sell Farm-Raised Striped Bass in New Jersey" that summarized our September 6th meeting with Prime Time Seafood/Pacifico, the company that wants to sell farm-raised striped bass in NJ. My summary of this meeting was then followed by a letter from Pacifco as to why they should be allowed to sell their bass here and wanted a JCAA response to their proposal.

The decision on this proposal is not made by me, but can only come from JCAA member clubs. I placed this issue on the agenda of our January 30th General Membership meeting for their consideration and vote. After considerable discussion and weighing the pros and cons of this proposal, our membership voted NO to this company's proposal to sell their striped bass in New Jersey. The letter (on JCAA letterhead) that explains our position on this matter to Pacifico follows:

2/14/2018

Mr. Mike Aldonas,

The following is the Jersey Coast Angler's Association (JCAA) response to your request for your proposal to sell farm-raised striped bass in New Jersey. The JCAA is an association of fishing clubs and at our club membership meeting held on Jan. 30, 2018, your proposal to the selling of striped bass in NJ was on our agenda for discussion. You are correct in that there are a number of benefits to the selling of your striped bass and they are: making striped bass more available in stores, restaurants and these fish are very healthy for human consumption. We recognize these benefits and others that you indicate in your proposal to us.

However, our big concern is that illegally caught striped bass would be sold as farm-raised under your Pacifico brand. As pointed out to you at our September 6th meeting, the tags that you place in your fish to brand them as Pacifico property can find their way to anglers who will catch local stripers and then pass them off as a Pacifico striped bass. What is to prevent a fish purveyor from selling/giving these tags to local anglers and then selling the striped bass they catch as a Pacifico product? This is a major issue that we brought to your attention at our September 6th meeting and it still remains unresolved. Even if the tags are supposed to be punched at the time of sale, who would monitor this? The economic benefits to pass off locally caught striped bass as belonging to Pacifico can be very tempting for the fishing industries that would sell your striped bass, and the local anglers who could generate hefty income from catching them.

The benefits and the drawbacks to your selling farm-raised striped bass in New Jersey was discussed and voted on by JCAA member clubs at our September 30 meeting. After considerable discussion, the JCAA clubs voted against your proposal to sell Pacifico striped bass in New Jersey.

Through the 1970's, our striped bass population was decimated and the JCAA along with other organizations succeeded with our legislators in making striped bass a no-sale Game Fish. While we all agreed that you run a very legitimate business, our members are very passionate about striper fishing. We proceed with caution to ensure the safety and viability of this popular fishery.

Letter to Regional Administrator NOAA GARFO on Artificial Reefs in the EEZ Off NJ

Dear Mike,

Congratulations on your recent appointment to head up the Greater Atlantic Regional Fisheries Office (GARFO). JCAA is pleased to know of your extensive background in sustainable fisheries management and look forward to working with you and your staff. We're also pleased that you hail from Point Pleasant, NJ and can relate to our local fishing issues and concerns.

JCAA is a statewide association of fishing clubs and organizations representing thousands of NJ recreational anglers and divers. Our mission includes seeking fair and equitable fisheries management, marine conservation, greater public access to shorelines and the promotion of responsible fishing practices.

As you know, the conflict caused by the commercial and recreational potting on the artificial reefs has languished for over 10 years. The NJ Reef Program was created in accordance with the 1984 Sport Fish Restoration Act. The objective of the Act is to restore "sport fish" stocks for the benefit of recreational anglers and divers. The Sport Fish Restoration Fund was established through payment of excise taxes by recreational anglers and divers on recreational products to manage and maintain the artificial reefs.

Pot fishing on the reefs is not consistent with the objectives of the Act. The presence of pots and pot lines interfere with and prevent anglers from fishing the very wrecks, reef balls and materials that they have paid for and deployed. The pot lines are also poorly marked and are a hazard to navigation. Funding to the reefs in federal waters was suspended because of these factors. JCAA urges NOAA to comply with the NJDEP and MAFMC request to designate the 13 artificial reef sites in the EEZ off NJ as Special Management Zones under the provisions of Amendment 9 of the Summer Flounder, Scup and Black Sea Bass Fishery Management Plan (in unison with the states of Delaware, Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and the Gulf states).

We therefore endorse and choose Alternate 2-Designate all 13 reef sites as SMZ. It is the only viable alternative to solve the conflict and restore funding.

Public Access Update

I have written several articles in the JCAA newsletter about public access issues, especially as it relates to anglers trying to have access to fishing locations that dot our shoreline. I spent four days in Trenton with a large number of groups, up to about 50 people or more, trying to hammer out language that can be used by Senator Smith to help him craft a bill that he could use to advance public access to our beaches and at other locations. Senator Smith wanted the NY/NJ Baykeeper, American Littoral Society, NJ Chamber of Commerce, and the NJ Business and Industry Association to give him the language for his bill by working with a broad range of representatives from various organizations. I represented the JCAA and the New Jersey Outdoor Alliance at these meetings.

Coming to a consensus with this large group of people protecting their own interests proved to be very difficult. For example, I remember a person representing a certain municipality at one of these meetings saying "When Sandy Hook Park closes, all those people want to come down to our town and use 'our' beaches." When she said that, I envisioned a large horde of barbarians riding on their horses to that town to pillage it. A glaring example is Sea Bright that has stairways over their wall with signs that say only locals can use them and no parking is allowed by the wall. There are many other examples, but you get the picture. Several years have gone by, but resolution to craft a Public Access Bill seemed to be a goal that was unreachable. That has changed!

Legislation, unanimously approved and released by the Senate Environment Committee on February, 2018 addresses many of the long-standing problems which have denied public access to state waters under the Public Trust Doctrine. The language to do this had to be hammered out over a long time with competing interest groups. Tim Dillingham, Executive Director, American Littoral Society, took a lead role in making this happen. While this has come out of Senator Smith's committee, it still has to be posted for a vote in the Senate and Assembly.

Tim Dillingham has requested organizations to sign on to his letter requesting Senator Paul Sarlo, Chairman, Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee to post Senate Bill 1074 for a vote. Approximately 15 organizations have signed on to this letter, including the JCAA and the NJOA, to post this bill.

So, we may finally see some action for resolution to a long-standing problem. I will keep you posted on its progress.


